







Puerto Rico is one of the jurisdictions in the United States with the highest incidence and prevalence of HIV.

As of October 31, 2022, a total of 50,614 people have been diagnosed with HIV or AIDS in PR. In 2019, the archipelago, compared to the other states and territories **ranked**:

14th with respect to HIV diagnoses, 7th in HIV prevalence, and 11th in the rate of Stage 3 (AIDS) diagnoses.









Rate of HIV Mother-to-Child Transmission by Year of Birth, Puerto Rico, 2005-15




Incidence Rate of Perinatally-Acquired HIV Infections (per 100,000 live births) by Year of Birth,
Puerto Rico, 1980-2016












