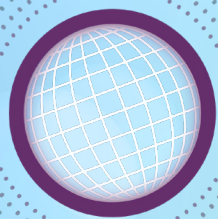

WELCOME FROM IAPAC

Dear Delegates,

On behalf of the International Association of Providers of AIDS Care (IAPAC), it is a privilege to welcome you to *Continuum 2025* and the city of San Juan, Puerto Rico. This year marks the 20th anniversary of our signature conference – two decades of convening to exchange knowledge, elevate science, and advance person-centered care. We gather in 2025 at a time of historic uncertainty, as the global HIV response faces profound disruption. Yet your presence here is a testament to the enduring strength of our collective resolve to protect progress, confront new challenges, and reimagine what the HIV response must look like for the future.

The *Continuum 2025* theme – “*Reframing HIV Care*” – was set more than a year ago, at a time when the horizon looked markedly different. The intention was to explore a more expansive, inclusive, and person-centered definition of HIV care – a definition that integrates prevention, mental health, primary care, and health-related quality of life alongside treatment and viral suppression to achieve U=U. What we could not foresee was the scale of existential threat we now face: erosion of public health institutions, political interference in science, and declining investments in HIV programs. In this context, the call to reframe HIV care is no longer aspirational, it is urgent and imperative.

Throughout this conference, we will explore how innovation – scientific, clinical, and structural – can be harnessed to deliver on the promise of equitable care for all people living with and affected by HIV. We will examine strategies to maintain and expand access to antiretroviral therapy (ART) and pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), strengthen and diversify the HIV workforce, leverage AI and digital technologies, and scale person-centered, community-led responses. But we will also name and confront the barriers – ideological, economic, and systemic – that are threatening to roll back decades of progress.

Twenty years ago, the conference (under its previous name *Adherence*) began as a space to support the HIV workforce to optimize adherence to ART and subsequently PrEP, and in 2024 the full HIV care continuum under its new name, *Continuum*. The conference has since grown into a multidimensional platform that continues to center equity, elevate lived experience, and prioritize health system resilience. Today, in this 20th anniversary year, *Continuum 2025* reaffirms its primary mission: to equip the HIV workforce with the knowledge, tools, and solidarity needed to meet this moment and shape what comes next.

IAPAC is proud to convene this global community at a time when unity of purpose is more essential than ever. We are particularly honored to welcome people living with and affected by HIV, whose insights and leadership continue to redefine what excellence in care truly means. Our gratitude also extends to the local stakeholders in San Juan, a Fast-Track City, and across the global network of Fast-Track Cities, who are doing the hard work of translating vision, goals, and targets into impact every single day on behalf of and centering communities.

As we embark on this 20th annual convening, I encourage you to engage with urgency, speak with clarity, and leave with renewed determination to end AIDS as a public health threat in our lifetimes. Let us honor the legacy of the past 20 years – not by retreating, but by rising to the challenge. In the face of adversity, let *Continuum 2025* be a call to action for us all to reframe the HIV response.

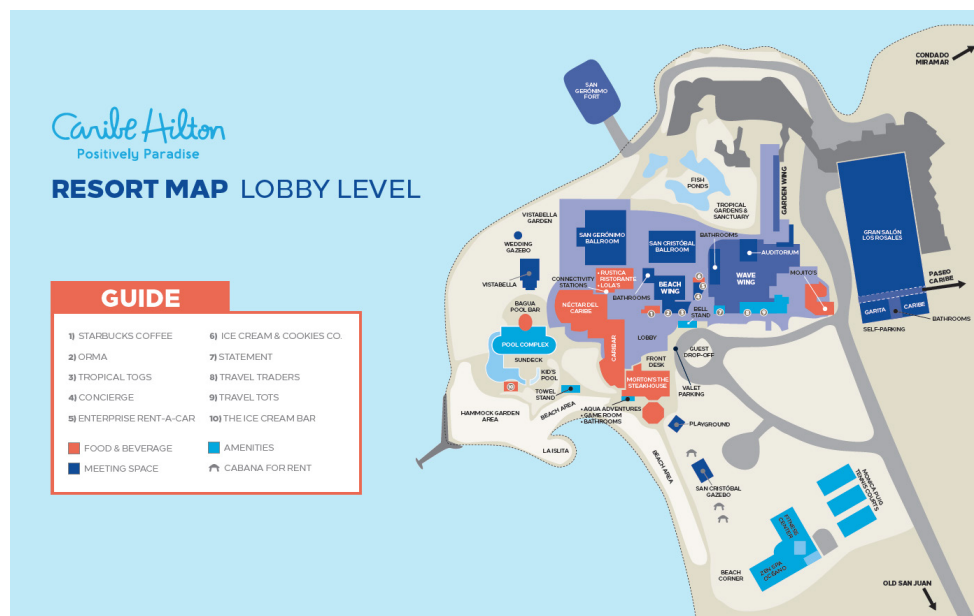
