

About Family Health Centers at NYU Langone




- The Family Health Centers at NYU Langone (FHC) is a FQHC network, established in 1967
- Primarily serves Sunset Park, Red Hook, Park Slope, and Flatbush neighborhoods of Brooklyn
- the FHC provided care for over 112,000 patients, with 52% being on Medicaid or Medicare and 28% being uninsured.
- Since 2016, the number of patients on pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) has increased from 50 to more than 600 in 2025. In that same time period, the FHC has been able to identify and provide HIV care to over 100 newly diagnosed patients, and about 800 clients currently active in HIV care






Continued Disparities in New Diagnoses and PrEP Uptake by Race/Ethnicity







Full implementation of this program started in September 2023






Program Challenges




- Clinic Location
- Patient navigators were hired in January 2024.
- Brand new clinic not establish patients.
- POCT HIV rapid testing wasn't available during the contract year.
- Not all providers and nurses were familiar with the PrEP / PEP workflow.
- Community was not aware abut PrEP and PEP services
- High stigma in the community












Program Outcomes Patient Demographics 2023-2025










Program Outcomes Patient Demographics 2023-2025











Program Outcomes Patient Source 2023-2025









Takeaways



- Outreach is essential to connect to potential patients
- Clinic support is essential.
- Support staff, nursing staff, and provider rolls are key for opening the PrEP and PEP conversation.
- Appointment availability is crucial for new enrollments, and provider flexibility to support availability.
- Counseling patients on PrEP who are at high risk (positive STI, history of STI, significant sexual history, or drug use) is necessary to increase provider and peer referrals.
- PrEP and PEP services are for everybody. Reducing stigma and having an open conversation with patients could increase PrEP intake.
- Clinic leadership buy-in is necessary to increase PrEP and PEP services.
